

2025 Parent/Caregiver/ Guardian Opinion Survey WE WANT OUR PARENTS / CAREGIVERS / GUARDIANS TO TELL US WHAT THEY THINK!

Our school is conducting the annual Parent / Caregiver / Guardian Opinion Survey offered by the Department of Education and is seeking your feedback. The survey is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of families' perceptions of school climate, student behavior, and student engagement. The survey is optional, but we encourage and appreciate your participation.

Our school will use the survey results to assist in identifying areas for improvement and professional develop-

ment needs in the school, to target school planning and improvement strategies.

The Parent / Caregiver / Guardian Opinion Survey will be open online from **Monday 18 August to Friday 19 September 2025.**

All families are invited to participate in the survey.

The survey will be conducted **online**, only takes **20 minutes** to complete, and can be accessed at any convenient time on desktop computers, laptops, tablets or smartphones.

The online survey will be available in English and 10 other languages including Arabic, Greek, Hakha Chin, Hindi, Japanese, Punjabi, Simplified Chinese, Somali, Turkish, and Vietnamese. Resources are also available in additional languages to assist parents / caregivers / guardians who speak a language other than English at home. Please reach out to your child's teacher, or the school directly for survey guides in your language.

Survey results will be communicated to parents / caregivers / guardians through annual reporting processes.

Morning Supervision Reminder

Just a reminder that the front doors do not open until 8.30am each morning. Students are expected to enter the school from Brazier St at the end of the basketball courts. Please remind students of this. At Eaglehawk Primary School, the school grounds are supervised by staff from approximately 8.20am before school and until 3.15pm after school. There may be staff in attendance at the school before and after those times, but those staff may be involved in tasks such as meetings or lesson preparation. This means that these staff members will not be supervising students. Some parents accompany their children to school and wait to see that they are settled. This practice is fine, and is certainly encouraged, as parents are supervising their own children. Formal after school care is available, if you are unable to collect your child by 3pm each day.

Smile Squad Treatment Van - Returning Soon

The Smile Squad treatment van will return to our school in early September to provide dental treatment for students who require it. Smile Squad clinicians have contacted families directly to explain any recommended treatment and obtain verbal consent over the phone.

If your child missed or you submitted a form late, please don't worry — they have not missed out. They will still be seen when the treatment van returns. Care provided through Smile Squad is free of charge.

GOALS, ASPIRATIONS AND RESPONDING

This week we welcomed Sue from the Quaglia Institute, who worked with each grade for 30 minutes on the theme of aspiration. Students learned that having an imagination or vision for a goal is just the first step, true aspirations come when you also take action. By combining imagination and action, students begin to see how their goals can be achieved. The sessions encouraged them to be responsible for their choices and to self reflect on the steps they're taking toward success.

It was inspiring to see students engage with these ideas and start thinking about how they can turn their dreams into achievable goals through effort, reflection, and persistence.

DID YOU KNOW?

Research shows that when children link their goals to purposeful action, they develop greater motivation, resilience, and confidence. Reflection and responsibility aren't just classroom skills, they're lifelong habits for success.



AT HOME REGULATION SUPPORTS

Here are some simple strategies families can use at home to support children with regulating their emotions and energy:

- Name the Feeling Help your child label emotions (e.g., 'I can see you're feeling frustrated'). Naming feelings reduces their intensity.
- Take a Pause Encourage short breaks, like stepping outside, having a drink of water, or doing a calming activity.
- Breathing Together Try slow 'box breathing' (breathe in for 4, hold for 4, out for 4, hold for 4).
- Use Movement Activities like walking, jumping on the trampoline, or kicking a ball can help release energy and reset.
- ◆ Model Calm Children copy what they see, When adults stay calm and use strategies, kids are more likely to do the same.

Topic 4: Problem Solving

Goal: Recognising solutions to problems.

Activity 1: With a family member, come up with 3 positive and different ways to solve this problem: You and your siblings arguing over which show to watch on TV.



P/1 Monique & Nick Recap:

This week in P/1 Nick and Monique, students have been exploring information texts. Students have been looking at the features of information books (e.g. title, pictures, index, facts and labelled diagrams). They have read about Koalas, Wombats and Goldfish. In Writing, they have been trying to apply their learning about information features to the layout of their own writing. Within Maths, students have been analysing the patterns within a number chart. They have been challenged to fill in the missing numbers and spot the mistakes. Further to this, students have been working on counting by 10's from a starting point other than 0. To ensure students are reading at home and achieving the reading night awards, we are asking if your student needs a reading diary and bag to let Monique and Nick know. Reminder to bring your hat, we will be starting to wear hats next week.

GRADE 1/2 TRACEY & GRADE 2 BRIDGET WEEK 5!

this week in reading the grade one/two classes have continued to read lots of fairytales - this time with a focus on the inside traits of characters. In writing, they have had a chance to go back to their own fairytales to include some descriptions of their own characters. They are all sounding amazing! In maths, we have been working with number lines.

During this week we had a visit from Sue to work on using student voice in our classroom goals. Students looked at ways to set goals and actions to take to achieve them.

WEEK 5 IN GRADE 34 JESS AND JACK!

In literacy in grade 3/4 Jess they have been learning about procedural texts. We have been reading lots of different recipes, crafts and instructions. The students have enjoyed writing their own procedural texts on a topic of choice.

In literacy in grade 3/4 Jack, the students have been learning about the features of legend stories. They have been working on writing a story retell to show their understanding.

In numeracy the students have been working hard on multiplying numbers by 10,100 and 1000. The students have been noticing patterns and tricks to help them solve some difficult equations. This week we have started looking at 2D and 3D shapes. We have been learning about the different properties of the shapes.

WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING IN THE 5/6 AREA THIS WEEK....

LITERACY

This week in Reading, students have been analysing figurative language to determine what type it is and how it is used to engage readers. Students have been doing this by identifying language features that help describe an event or action. Discussing what the language feature is trying to do describe. Classifying what the language/word features and comparing the two different figurative language types.

This week in Writing, students have been experimenting with the use of figurative language in historical narratives. They have been matching similes and metaphors to the mood of characters and the atmosphere in their historical events.

NUMERACY

This week in Maths, students have been learning to order decimal numbers by building on their understanding of whole numbers and parts of numbers. They have practised rounding tenths to the nearest whole number, rounding hundredths to the nearest whole number or tenth, and ordering tenths from least to greatest and greatest to least. Students have also been using their knowledge of decimal place value to explain and justify their reasoning when ordering numbers. This week in Applied Maths, we are learning to describe and perform translations, reflections, and rotations, while noticing what changes and what stays the same. We are also learning to identify lines of symmetry in different shapes and patterns.

Urgent Headlice

We are unfortunately still have cases of head lice within the school.

While head lice are a common childhood issue and do not pose a health risk, they can spread easily and cause discomfort if not promptly treated.

What Happens If Head Lice Are Found at School?

If a member of staff notices that a student appears to have head lice during the school day, **a confidential note will be sent home with the student at the end of the day**. This note will inform parents or carers so that prompt treatment can be arranged.

Treatment and Return to School

To help prevent the spread of lice among students:

- Apply treatment. Treatments can be purchased from the super market or chemist.
- All lice and eggs (nits) must be completely removed from the hair.

If needed, treatment should be repeated as per the product instructions to ensure complete eradication.

Prompt action ensures your child is comfortable and helps protect others in their class.

How You Can Help

We kindly ask all families to:

- Check your child's hair regularly (at least once a week), especially if a case has been reported in your child's class.
- Use a fine-tooth comb and appropriate treatment products if lice or eggs are found.

Tie long hair back to help minimise the spread of lice.

Your cooperation in managing head lice effectively is greatly appreciated. Working together ensures our students stay healthy,


