

From the Classroom

Prep with Monique and Sophie

A very fun week in the Prep! We got out of the classroom and went to the Kyabram Fauna Park to learn about all the animals. Students learnt about animal habitats, life cycles and features of different animals. We saw lots of different animals such as Emus, Meerkats, Dingoes, Reptiles and lots more! In writing, students chose an animal they saw at the Fauna Park and wrote everything they learnt about that animal. Students also drew a picture of their chosen animal and labelled it. Students have written a good copy on a poster, so hopefully you will see this hanging somewhere in the school soon! In Reading, we spent our last week reading information books, focusing on the diagrams and pictures. Students learnt how diagrams and pictures can give us more information about a topic. In maths, students have been learning different strategies they can use to solve addition problems such as doubles facts (5+5), tens facts (6+4) and counting on from the largest number.









Grade 1/2 with Amber and Ellie

This week in the 1/2 area in maths we have been practicing our multiplication by investigating partial arrays. We have been focusing on continuing our persuasive reading and writing. Here is a piece from Hudson.

4/5/6 with Tayla and Nick

This week in literacy we have been exploring and critiquing discussion texts. We have discussed the reasons why a writer might choose to present a persuasive piece as a discussion. We have analysed opposing arguments and spent time in writing, crafting our own opposing arguments for our texts.

In maths, we have been multiplying whole numbers by decimal numbers. Have a go at one of our maths questions from this week:

Nick planted olive trees along his fence line. They grow 0.8cm a month. How much taller will they grow each:

- year
- 3 years
- 5 years

10 years

Enabling:

Nick planted olive trees along his fence line. They grow 0.2cm a month. How much taller will they grow each?

Extending:

Nick planted olive trees along his fence line. They grow 0.04cm a month. How much taller will they grow each?

We have also begun our investigation into chance and probability. This week we looked at the likelihood of four coins landing on heads or tails when flipped. We found that the most likely outcome is two heads and two tails.

Our school wide focus this week has been 'I follow instructions first time, every time'. We have been practicing this expectation as well as discussing what it means and looks like.

ART with Sharon

Prep, Grade One and Grade Two students have been learning how to create patterns. Prep students constructed and decorated zebras with stripe patterns. Grade One and Two students decorated elephants with line patterns and made a border for their pictures with patterns of colored squares.

Grade Three and Four students have been learning how to create texture in their art work. This week they created collage birds using colored and patterned paper.

Grade Four and Five and Grade Five and Six students studied the work of the artist Mulga and adapted the main features of his work in a Mulga inspired art piece.







Music with Sharon

Our classes are beginning to prepare for our Christmas Concert at the end of term (notification of the date will be published in next week's newsletter). The Students are looking forward to the opportunity to share some of the skills they have developed through the music program this year. Preparing for and participating in a concert is a fun way to build confidence, develop memory skills, promote teamwork and practise responsibility, creativity and resilience.



Chinese with Phoebe

Grade 1&2

The Grade 1 and 2 students learned five Chinese words regarding fruit this week. These included 水果(fruit),

橘子 (mandarin), 柚子 (pomelo), 梨 (pear), and 西瓜 (watermelon). They practiced these words through playing two rounds of *what is missing* game and singing the fruit song.

Grade 3&4

The Grade 3 and 4 students reviewed the sentences to introduce family members' occupations (wŏ de ... shì My (family member) is (occupation).). They practiced this sentence pattern through playing the sentence unjumble game. Moreover, they worked on making the mini story book to introduce themselves from last week.



Grade 4-5 Tayla & Grade 5-6 Nick

The Grade 4-5 & 5-6 students continued the exploration of Beijing.

They reviewed the Chinese words of tourist attractions and food in Beijing from last week. They also did some reading on the two tourist attractions. Instead of reading individually or listening to the teacher reading, students were invited onto the platform to be the "tour guide" and answered questions from the audience. In this way, students learned more about the famous places through an interactive way and experienced the role of a teacher.

FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access
 to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the
 requirements of the Curriculum. This includes the Victorian Curriculum F-10, the
 Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) including the VCE Vocational Major and the
 Victorian Pathways Certificate.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.

PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:



Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

 Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).




FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES
