

Hats

Morning Supervision Reminder

Just a reminder that the front doors do not open until 8.30am each morning. Students are expected to enter the school from Brazier St at the end of the basketball courts. Please remind students of this.

At Eaglehawk Primary School, the school grounds are supervised by staff from approximately 8.20am before school and until 3.15pm after school. There may be staff in attendance at the school before and after those times, but those staff may be involved in tasks such as meetings or lesson preparation. This means that these staff members will not be supervising students. Some parents accompany their children to school and wait to see that they are settled. This practice is fine, and is certainly encouraged, as parents are supervising their own children. Formal after school care is available, if you are unable to collect your child by 3pm each day.

Breakfast Program

Students are welcome to attend breakfast program. All our adult volunteers have a Working with Children's Check and we have a staff member also in attendance. Students who attend breakfast club are expected to follow the school's expectations. These include:

-eating at the tables, (no food to be taken out of the kitchen)

- taking 2 pieces of toast (1 cheese toasty) at a time (Students can go back for more, but this way there is less food wastage and teaches sharing and awareness of others)
- cleaning up when they have finished by taking plates over to the sink, pushing chair in and wiping their place if needed

Fundraising – Reverse Christmas

Eaglehawk Primary students are so lucky to be supported by many organisations such as Smith Family, MAD-COW (breakfast and mentors), families (school council and lunches) etc. Each year the school likes to acknowledge this support by supporting a Reverse Christmas for families in need. This week in P/I Nick and Monique, we welcomed all students back for Term 4 and resettled into classroom routine. We also welcomed back our Education Support Staff Jaime and our new Education Support Staff member Trish.

In reading, students have been learning about what a verb is (action/ doing word). They have been reading procedures and identifying the verbs in each step. We created a poster of all the verbs we found over the week and we found ALOT.

In Writing, students learnt how to write a list of what we need (ingredients, materials or equipment) for their procedure. The procedures included how to make a jam toast and how to brush your teeth.

Dyslexia is the most common learning difficulty. It affects 5 to 10 per cent of Australian students.

Dyslexia Awareness Month (DAM) is marked around the world. It's a great opportunity for teachers to learn more about evidence–based supports for students with learning difficulties.

What is dyslexia?

Dyslexia is a specific learning disability with impairment in reading. It is characterised by difficulties in accurate and fluent word decoding and spelling.

Many students with dyslexia also experience difficulties in working memory, attention and organisation.

What are the signs?

Students may need support and extra time than other students to:

- · read words accurately
- understand the meaning of what they read
- · spell words.

Effective teaching strategies

Explicit teaching benefits all students and is essential for students with dyslexia. Useful supports may include:

- · speech-to-text software
- extra time for tasks
- visual supports
- · breaking down tasks.

Why is it important to help?

Reading is vital to all aspects of learning and every area of the curriculum. Dyslexia is a life-long condition. Students need evidence-based support and intervention throughout their schooling.

Early intervention will:

- improve students' learning and wellbeing
- . help prevent students from falling behind.

With the right evidence-based support and instruction, dyslexic students can reach their learning potential.

Did you know that 1 in 14 Australian students has a Developmental Language Disorder (DLD) and many more have language difficulties?

DLD Day is marked around the world. It's a great opportunity for teachers to learn more about evidence-based resources to support students with DLD.

What is language?

Language is the ability to understand and use spoken, written and other communication symbols.

Language is vital to all aspects of student learning and well being, across the curriculum and throughout schooling.

What is a language difficulty?

Many students have language difficulties. DLD is a formal diagnosis of a language difficulty that is significant and persistent.

What are the signs?

Students with DLD may need support to:

- understand words, follow instructions or answer questions
- find the words to express ideas
- say words in the right order.

Why is it important to help?

Students with DLD are 4 times more likely to have maths disabilities and 6 times more likely to have reading disabilities.

They are also more likely to suffer from depression and anxiety.

Early intervention will improve students' relationships, personal development, education, employment prospects and quality of life.

Teaching practices that support language development benefit all students and are essential for students with language difficulties.



About 1 in 20 Australian school students have attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD).

ADHD Awareness Month is a great opportunity for teachers to learn more about evidence-based supports for students with ADHD.

What is ADHD?

ADHD is a neurodevelopmental difference characterised by persistent and significant inattention, hyperactivity and impulsivity.

There are 3 main types:

- Inattentive
- Hyperactive-impulsive
- . Combined (most common)

What are the signs?

Students with ADHD may need support:

- focussing and directing attention
- managing distractions
- keeping track of things
- . thinking things through before acting
- · planning, organising and regulating emotions.

Teaching strategies

Individualised effective teaching strategies include:

- Give simple, clear instructions
- · Get students attention before speaking
- Create consistent routines
- Provide movement breaks
- Break down tasks
- Provide extra time for tasks
- Provide visual supports
- Teach organisation skills.

Why is it important to help?


Students with ADHD need evidence-based support and intervention throughout their schooling.
